PLANT DETAILS

Euphorbia rigida GOPHER PLANT

These shrubby, but succulent plants are comprised of multiple low to sprawling stems with whorled pointed foliage. Typically grow to 2 ft. tall and spread in a rounded fashion to about 3 ft. wide. During spring, each branch will form a sizeable umbel of pea-sized, yellow flowers surrounded by bright chartreuse colored bracts. Often, from the weight of these blooms the stems bend downward, but they still maintain a shrubby appearance. They are adaptable, extremely heat tolerant and lower water use. Welldrained soil is a must to help them thrive. Blooming can sap their strength and some branch die-back can occur, which is normal. Refresh the entire plant by pruning all stems back to the ground, and new stems with fresh foliage will sprout and grow back quickly.
